CASA of Southeast Mississippi is excited to officially welcome the **Honorable Stacie Zorn** as the newly elected Jackson County Youth Court Judge (County Court Judge, Place 1). **Judge Zorn**, along with returning Youth Court **Judge Darryl Hurt, Jr**. of George County and **Judge Cheryl K. Pierce** of Greene County, both of whom serve as Special Family Masters for the 16th Chancery District, were officially sworn in for their respective duties on January 3 by Mississippi Supreme Court Presiding Justice Honorable **James W. After her first weeks in office, **Judge Zorn** says one of the biggest challenges is becoming familiar with all of the rules and regulations of the law and how they specifically apply to the youth court system. She has gained a wealth of knowledge from visiting in other courts and developing a positive dialogue with other youth court judges from the other Coast counties.

Judge Zorn gave special thanks to the CASA volunteers who have appeared in her court and have been able to provide significant information regarding the children on their individual cases. She appreciates all of the volunteers and their dedication to serving the children of Jackson County. **Judge Zorn** also realizes the importance of having a CASA on a case in particular situations to help supply additional critical information to help guide the child and the case through the court process.

Two in-service opportunities hosted by the Jackson County Youth Court staff are available in February. Both trainings are being done in the Youth Court. Please give your advocate supervisor a call if you would like to attend one or both since **space is very limited**.

Thursday, February 2nd at **11:00 am** – **Coastal Family Health** – They have a grant to help parents get into treatment, and they do all the leg work. Anyone who deals with neglect and abuse victims would benefit and anyone else who wants to learn more about their services.

Friday, February 3rd at **9:00 am** – The *Modification Behavior Services* – They offer anger management classes for adults and teens, parenting classes, and other services. Everyone working with clients (youth or adults) needs to attend this training and anyone else who wants to learn about the information is invited to attend.

These links provide an easy way to gain your **required** in-service hours. The in-service completion form is available to complete and email or hand deliver to your CASA supervisor. A Foster Care Review (aka County Conference) is held every six months to discuss and review the permanent plan of the child/children's in foster care. Your attendance and input is requested. The review is **NOT** a court hearing, however, the testimony delivered during the review will be provided to the Court to aid in making decisions about the child/children's best interests.
